1. Guide to Registering for Classes

A. General Requirements

- 1) Class registration should be planned carefully and completed within the specified period.
- 2) Guidelines for registration
After preparing a list of courses you have completed and courses you would like to take for the Fall semester of 2026, including the credits for these courses, you must get guidance from your academic advisor.
- 3) Number of credits students may register for each semester
 - ※ To qualify as a registered student, a student must register for at least one subject per semester. This includes students awaiting graduation. To graduate, students must be registered for at least 8 semesters in which credits necessary for a regular registered semester (minimum of 8 semesters) or for graduation remains.
 - ※ **Students who have fulfilled credit requirement for graduation cannot enroll in courses inclusive of chapel.**

4) Guide to Carrying Over Credits

A) After the 2026 Spring semester period for registration and changing courses is over, if the number of credits a student is registered for is under the credit limit (the domestic university registration standard of 18 credits), the missing number of credit can be registered for in the 2026 Fall semester. To qualify for registration for extra credits, students must be under the maximum number of years of attendance.

※ Not applicable to students who registered for more than 18 credits in the previous semester and part-time students (students who are registered for 1 to 9 credits).

B) Possible number of carried-over

(1) Only credits remaining from the previous semester can be carried over. Students may additionally register for a maximum of 2 credits in the next semester if there are remaining credits to fill. If remaining credits from the previous semester are not used in the following semester, they will automatically be annulled.

(2) However, 21 maximum credits (24 credits for Department of Medicine students, 30 credits for Department of Pre-Medicine students) are allowed for a semester.

5) To graduate, courses must be taken according to the curriculum of the year a student entered Ewha (see Ewha Homepage(Korean) > 학사안내 > 교과과정안내). All requirements and mandatory courses for the major must be met and completed.

※ Notification on the Removal of the Required Liberal Arts Courses for Students Who Entered from 2013 to 2019(Effective from 2024 Academic Year)

- The following courses will no longer be required for students who entered the university before 2019: Share Leadership(11095), Korean Language and Writing(10021), Reading Classics and Writing(11094), Storytelling and Writing(11202), Global Business Communication(11203), the Second Foreign Language I, II (Chinese I, Chinese II, French I, French II, German I, German II, Japanese I, Japanese II, Spanish I, Spanish II, Russian I, Russian II(3 hrs/2 credits)).
- These courses will not be offered from 2024.
- The students who were required to choose among the Second Foreign Language I, II/Advanced English or the Second Foreign Language I, II/Advanced English/Global Business Communication are subject to the removal of the Required Liberal Arts Courses.
- As the removal will be effective from 2024 academic year (March 1st, 2024), students who will graduate or complete (course completion and graduation delay) the university in February 2024 are not subject to the removal of the Required Liberal Arts Courses.

6) The security of the course registration system has been strengthened as follows to prevent macro.

(1) Before course registration : Entering macro prevention key

You must enter a macro prevention key once before course registration to access "Wish list," "Course Registration", or "Chapel" menus. - After you enter the macro prevention key once, no additional macro preventive key input is requested until you log out.

(2) During course registration: Macro Prevention

If students try to click excessively more than the number of times that system manager set up, putting keyword page would come up on the screen for macro prevention. If excessive clicks occur, the course registration will be restricted, and you must retry the process.

B. Registration for Courses

1) Internet Course Registration

A) Registration is possible through the internet course registration system.

B) Course registration login: Students can login and use the wish list 30 minutes prior to the registration period.

**This course registration period applies to students in the 2+4 year pharmacy program. It does not apply to students in the integrated 6-year pharmacy program, applicable to those admitted from 2022 onward.

- ※ The waitlist system and the cancellation delay system are not applied during the priority registration periods.
- ※ There is no separate period for students returning from leave of absence, so they must register for courses within the normal registration period, and confirm and change courses at the same times as regular students.

3) How to use “Wish List”

- A) After entering your desired courses, you may use them during the registration period (maximum of 15 allowed).
- B) Available options for using the wish list:
 - (1) View/Register for Courses: You can add courses to your wish list while also being able to view the course name, instructor’s name and course syllabus.
 - (2) Direct Input: You can directly enter the course number/class and add to your wish list.
- C) The course will appear on your “Wish List”, and press the “Del” button in order to delete the course from the list.

4) Implementation of Priority Registration

- A) Eligible Students:
 - (1) Political Science & International Relations, Economics, Psychology, Communication Media, Statistics, Content Convergence, Computer Science & Engineering Major(Determined at the time of registration) or Double-Major students(Year of Study: 2-4)

- (2) Business Administration Major(Determined at the time of registration) or Double-Major students(Year of Study: 1-4)
- B) Available Courses: Political Science & International Relations, Economics, Psychology, Communication Media, Statistics, Content Convergence, Computer Science & Engineering and Business Administration Major Courses (Major foundation courses are not available!)
- * Because of the limited number of students who can take the courses, registration is possible only within the quota designated for each grade that the students belong to.
- C) Available number of credits for registration: Among the Major Courses open for Priority Registration, a maximum of 12 credits can be registered.
e.g.) For students majoring in Business Administration with a Double-Major in Psychology, a maximum of 12 credits can be given for the courses by the Department of Psychology and Business Administration.
- D) Registration Period and Method: Priority registration opens for all eligible students during the designated period.
- 5) Registration for Extra Credit Courses
Students can register for one additional course (1 credit) from the following list of extra credit courses after registering for the maximum number of credits (excluding credits carried over from previous semesters) allowed over the semester in each major. There are no restrictions on registering for extra credit courses within the maximum number of credits.
- A) Extra Credit Courses: Social Services Activity for the Students I(10575), Social Service Activity for the Students II(10578), Social Service Activity for the Students III(10579), Strategic Employment Planning(10812)
- B) Credit limit: Students can register for extra credit courses within a maximum total of 21 credits.
- C) Registration Period: Students can register for extra credit courses during the registration period of each semester (for each school year).
- D) Cancellation, withdrawal and change of courses
- (1) Students can cancel, but not withdraw, registration of an extra credit course if they exceed the number of maximum credits.
- (2) After cancelling an extra credit course, students cannot change the course to one that is not eligible for extra credit.
- (3) Students can cancel or change, but not withdraw from, an extra credit course within a maximum total of 21 credits.
- 6) How to register for classes
- A) Students can register the courses within the designated period for each school year.
- B) Available options for course registration:
- (1) View/Register with wish list: You can register for courses previously added to your wish list.
- (2) View/Register for Courses: You can register for courses after searching for a specific course and viewing information such as the instructor's name, syllabus, etc.
- (3) Direct Input: You can register by directly entering the course number and class.
- C) You can view your course registration on 수강신청내역조회(View Course Registration) menu,

and if you have entered the course number or class number incorrectly, select the course and press the "Del" button in the course registration table to cancel your registration.

- D) The Waitlist system will be used during the regular course registration period before the start of each semester (February/August.) You can see your waitlist courses and waitlist rank. If your status changes from waitlisted to registered, the course will be moved from your waitlisted course list to your "My Course List." **Possible credits per semester includes registered classes and courses on waitlist.**
 - E) The Delayed Cancellation system will be used during the course registration confirmation/change period (March/September) after the start of each semester. For classes that have reached maximum enrollment, the delayed cancellation system will be applied when seats become available. Registration for seats that have become available due to cancellations will open for 30 minutes per hour. Students who wish to enroll must check the number of available seats and attempt to register during the designated open time.
 - F) After registering, you must press the "Logout" button on the upper right side of the window.
 - ※ Students cannot register online for courses that have not been entered into the internet registration system as they will not be recognized.
 - ※ To register for Graduate School courses, refer to 9) "Graduate courses valid for undergraduate registration" below.
- 7) Changes to registration due to cancellation of courses
After the period for registration confirmation and change, students who have registered for classes canceled due to the lack of numbers must check the homepage for notices related to the cancellation. Affected students should register for new courses that do not conflict with other registered courses within the determined period in person.
- 8) Important Notes
- A) Students responsible for the course registration for themselves. Passwords should not be given to others(this includes course registration done by another person), as this may lead to errors in course registration or personal information leakage. To change your password, go to Ewha homepage (Korean)→ 유레카→ 개인정보변경→ 비밀번호변경. Passwords that have been changed 30 days prior must also be changed through "Change Password".
 - B) All classes are capped, and registration will be blocked once the class cap has been reached. If the class you want has too many people, you must register for another class or for another course.
 - C) You cannot register for courses that overlap (including Chapel).
 - D) In case of Liberal Arts courses that are designated to certain majors, students must register for the class section designated to their major.
Ex.: For "Integrated Thinking and Writing", "College English", "Advanced English" and "The World & Christianity", students must register for the class section specified in the "Remarks Column" of the Comprehensive Course Schedule.
 - E) Courses that have not been registered through the internet will not be recognized as registered. If a student does not attend a course that she has registered for online, she will be given an F for this course. If a student attends a class other than the one she registered for, even if it has the same course number, she will be given an F for the course she registered for.

- F) If a student completes a major foundation course or a major course which was included in the curriculum prior to her entrance, but was later excluded from the curriculum due to reorganization of the curriculum, the course will not be recognized as a major foundation course or a major course. (This includes intensive major courses.)
- G) Important notes for registering to repeat courses.
- (1) It is possible to repeat courses with the same course number. Even if the course title changes, courses with the same course number are regarded as the same course.
 - (2) If a student completes a course according to an earlier version of the curriculum whose course number and title are subsequently changed, students may still repeat the course if it is a “compatible repeat course”. See “view compatible repeat courses” in the course registration menu.
 - (3) Students must be careful not to register for “compatible repeat courses”, mistaking them for different courses with separate credit recognition, because although their course numbers and titles are different, they will be recognized as the same course and processed as if the student were repeating one course.
 - (4) Students may only repeat a course if they originally got a grade lower than C+. The highest grade possible in a repeated course is A0(starting from 2026 Spring semester).
 - (5) Even if a student’s grade for the repeated course is lower than that of the original grade, the grade for the repeated course will be the one that is counted.
 - (6) If registering to repeat a course, the year and semester of the original class will be listed in the “repeat” column.
- H) Students may not take a course their parents teach. Students should avoid the liberal arts and elective courses as much as possible, and choose another class of the required courses.

※ Please note the application form has been revised starting from 2026-1 semester, so make sure to check the updated form.

C. Registration for Credit Exchange Courses

1) General Requirements for Credit Exchange Courses

- A) Credits obtained from other domestic or foreign universities may not exceed half of the total credits needed to graduate.
- B) A student may register for up to 6 credits obtained from other universities each semester. This includes the four universities’ credit exchange courses.
- C) As the credits from other universities’ courses for which a student is registered count toward the total number of credits for a semester, students should be careful not to exceed the number of credits for which they are registered. Refer to 1. Guide to registering for classes→ A) Common requirements→ 3) Possible credits for each semester above.
- D) If registered for a course at another university identical to a course completed at Ewha, this course will not count as completed credits.
- E) As other universities have different timetable systems, students should be careful that there is no clash with the timetable for their Ewha courses. The Ewha registration system cannot detect overlaps of courses at other universities with Ewha courses.
- F) Following students cannot register for courses at other universities:
 - (1) Students who plan to graduate in this semester
 - (2) Students who plan to propose or change their Major in this semester
 - (3) Students who plan to change their department in this semester
 - (4) Non-College of Education students who plan to apply for the teacher training program in this semester

2. Guide to Registration for Chapel

A. General Requirements

- 1) Students who have completed fewer than 7 semesters are automatically given a fixed day of the week for chapel according to their College and year. (See E. Chapel Times for designated days.) Thus, only students who need to change the day of the week or need to repeat the course must register.
- 2) **Returning students, readmitted students, students transferring in the Fall semester of 2026, and students in or past their 8th semester must register for chapel in person.**
- 3) In principle, drill credits are limited to 1 credit per semester. Students may additionally register for Chapel (drill credits) not completed in the previous semester, but may not register for drill credits for the next semester ahead of time.
- 4) Students can only register for a maximum of 2 make-up days per credit per semester.
- 5) Students who have not completed chapel credits (a total of 8 credits) before their semester of graduation may not graduate and complete the school year according to article 48 clause 3 of Ewha's Regulations. Students transferring as juniors must complete 4 credits.

B. Period for Registration and How to Register for Chapel

- 1) **Period for Registration:** Refer to 1. Guide to Registering for Classes → B. Registration for Courses → 2) Course registration schedule above.
- 2) **How to Register for Chapel**
Use the internet registration system: <http://sugang.ewha.ac.kr> → chapel registration.
 - A) Search for seats: Internet registration system (<http://sugang.ewha.ac.kr>) → chapel registration.
 - B) Select your preferred time and day of the week and save to register.
- 3) **Canceling Registration**
 - A) Search for the designated day of week/ seat, or for the day of week/ seat that you have registered for.
 - B) Select the day of week/ seat you wish to cancel and press the "Delete" button.
 - ※ To change the day of the week, cancel the designated day of week/ seat and then register again.
 - ※ After registering, you must press the "Exit" button of the lower left of the window to end the registration.

F. Software(SW) Courses

1) Software(SW) Course -Requirements

A) Students who entered after 2020

- (1) In order to reinforce SW education, a total of 6 credits must be completed among the courses recognized as SW courses.
- (2) The SW courses are provided as liberal arts courses or major courses and students may choose among these courses in various combinations to satisfy the mandatory 6 credits. Students who complete the mandatory 3 credits in the Computing and Mathematical Thinking area, which are basic liberal arts courses, can include the credits in the mandatory 6 credits for SW courses. In this case, only 3 more credits need to be taken to satisfy the 6 credit SW course requirements. In addition to this, 3 credits can also be taken by 'IT Certification'.

2) Liberal arts SW courses

- #### A) The liberal arts courses designated as SW courses are dispersed in four of the Six areas of Core course (science and technology, literature and language, art and expression, human and society), or included in the Computing and Mathematical Thinking area. They are also included in general liberal arts courses.

- #### A) Courses designated as SW courses in each major: If a student completed SW courses from other major, credits will be given as general optional courses not major credits.

5. Guide to Other Courses

A. Distance Learning Courses

- 1) The courses that consist of distance learning with more than 10 weeks out of 15 weeks are Distance Learning Courses.
- 2) Distance Learning Courses encompass the Distance Learning Courses offered through Ewha Cyber Campus, and the K-MOOC Courses.
- 3) The Maximum Distance Learning Courses credits you can receive per semester is 9 credits, whilst the maximum Distance Learning Courses credits you can receive during your undergraduate/ graduate studies is 20% of the total number of credits required for graduation.

B) Distance Learning Courses should be over 200 students per course.

B. THE BEST Blended Module-based Learning Course

1) THE BEST blended module-based learning course consists of ‘online conceptual learning’ and ‘offline application learning’ in the classroom.

- 2) Online conceptual learning and offline application learning are as follows:
 - A) Online conceptual learning: Understanding theoretical concepts and knowledge through lecture videos and online learning activities
 - B) Offline application learning: Based on the foundational understanding gained through online conceptual learning, offline application learning focuses on enriching learning through interaction among students or between students and instructors. In the classroom, students review what they have learned, collaborate with classmates in group activities for in-depth learning, and exchange active feedback.
- 3) The linked module of online conceptual learning and offline application learning should be conducted more than five times per semester (15 weeks).

C. THE BEST+ Problem-Solving Project-Based Courses

- 1) THE BEST+ problem-solving project-based course refers to a course that applies a teaching and learning method in which students work in teams, under the guidance and support of the instructor, to carry out a project and explore solutions to a given problem or a problem they have identified themselves.
- 2) Problem-solving projects are classified into three types: "Understanding by Inquiry", "Learning by Design" and "Stepping into Practice".

D. Self-Planning Modules

- 1) The Self-Planning Module is a system that allows students to design and take modules of their choice, composed of basic competency or general education courses related to their major, and they are offered in short-term formats (5 to 8 weeks).
- 2) Students can select and complete the modules they need. If a student completes modules totaling 15 weeks or more, they can receive academic credit by enrolling in the Self-Planning Module course.
- 3) By allowing students to choose their own curriculum, this system enhances student autonomy and choice, while enabling them to take foundational courses necessary for their major in a flexible and accessible online format based on their individual needs.
- 4) Self-Planning Module courses are available through the university's Share Campus

(<https://share.ewha.ac.kr>). Students who wish to receive academic credit must register for the Self-Planning Module course during the course registration period.

※ As of July 2026, a total of thirty-four Self-Planning Module courses are being offered:

- Three courses in Mathematics, six in Chemistry, three in Physics, five in the common field, and seventeen in AI.

- For a detailed list of available courses, please refer to the Self-Planning Module section on Share Campus.

- 5) Self-Planning Module Courses: Self-Planning Modules I (11502), Self-Planning Modules II (11503), Self-Planning Modules III (11504), Self-Planning Modules(AI) (11547)

※ Each course is worth one credit, and students may earn up to a maximum of three credits through Self-Planning Module courses during their enrollment period.

※ Self-Planning Modules I ~ III grant credit for courses in the Mathematics, Chemistry, Physics, Common, and AI fields, while Self-Planning Modules(AI) grants credit only for courses in the AI field.

E. First-Year Seminar·HOKMA Seminar

- 1) The First-Year Seminar is held in the spring semester of each year for freshmen in the Colleges of Liberal Arts(Course no.: 10845), Social Sciences(10848), Natural Sciences(10851), Art and Design(11231), Education(10857), Business Administration(10863), Science & Industry Convergence(11222), Nursing(11224), Pharmacy(11401), Division of Brain & Cognitive Sciences(11402) and International Studies(11117) of Scranton College(HOKMA Seminar(11302) is for HOKMA College freshmen). The course aims to aid students' understanding of Ewha, to give students guidance in their university life, and to advise students on their major and study methods.

The relevant students may register for the First-Year Seminar(or HOKMA Seminar) **within their College and course section**. Each class is limited to around 10 students. Classes start in the first week of the semester and course schedule may differ according to the professor's or students' circumstances. Freshmen earn 1 credit (grade: S/U, which is included in graduating credits) when completing the First-Year Seminar (according to each college).

The relevant students may register for the First-Year Seminar(or HOKMA Seminar) **within their College and course section**. Each class is limited to around 10 students. Classes start in the first week of the semester and course schedule may differ according to the professor's or students' circumstances. Freshmen earn 1 credit (grade: S/U, which is included in graduating credits) when completing the First-Year Seminar (according to each college).

- 2) Scranton College (Scranton Honors Program) students must complete the First-Year for their first major in the first semester of their freshman year, and register for the Scranton Seminar (Course no.: 10844) in the second semester of their freshman year.
- 3) HOKMA Scholars Program freshmen must complete HOKMA Seminar (Course no.: 11302) in the first semester of their freshman year.
- 4) Global Scholars Program freshmen must complete Global HOKMA Seminar 1 : First Step at Ewha (Course no.: 11501) in the first semester of their freshman year.
- 5) Students who are not freshmen of the corresponding college may not register for the First-

Year Seminar, HOKMA Seminar and Global HOKMA Seminar. First-Year Seminar, HOKMA and Global HOKMA Seminar cannot be repeated.

F. Social Service Activity for the Student (I, II, III) Courses

1) Course Information

- A) Course title: Social Service Activity for the Students I, II, and III (Course no. : 10575, 10578, and 10579), 2 hours and 1 credit each
- B) Course Completion: A student registered for this course can earn 1 credit per semester for 3 semesters. The course is classed as a Future Planning(Career Leadership) of Optional General Courses.
- C) Course Structure: 6 hours of theory classes (2 online and 2 in-person sessions), 26 hours of volunteer work and required assignments on the CyberCampus.
- D) Grading: Graded as S (Satisfactory) or U (Unsatisfactory).
- E) Prerequisites: 'Social Service Activity for the Students I' is required for II; 'Social Service Activity for the Students II' is required for III.
- F) Class Sections: For 'Social Service Activity for the Students I', class sections must be selected according to the volunteer field.

(1) Section 01: For Children and Youth fields

(2) Section 02: For Persons with Disabilities, Women, the Elderly, Civil Organizations, Healthcare, and Other fields

※ Note: No field restrictions apply to 'Social Service Activity for the Students II' and 'Social Service Activity for the Students III'

- G) **Course withdrawals are NOT allowed: Students must take responsibility in fulfilling extramural service activities; therefore, no withdrawals are permitted.**
- H) Students who have difficulty communicating in Korean, should contact the Social Service Team before registering at an institution for Social Service Activity classes.
- I) If students perform volunteer work during the vacation immediately preceding the semester with prior approval from the Social Service Team, it will be recognized toward their course requirements.

※ Note: Vacation volunteer work is an optional alternative for students with busy semester schedules.

2) Application & Registration Timeline & Procedure

Students may choose to do their volunteer work at (1) an institution recommended by Ewha, or (2) an institution chosen by the student (subject to approval).

Students must register for Social Service Activity through MyEureka during the following period. Registration is processed on a first come, first served basis.

- A) Prior Approval Application period for Summer Vacation of 2026: 09:00 Tue, Jun 23, 2026 - 17:00 Fri, Aug 21, 2026
- B) Registration period for Fall semester of 2026

- (1) Institution recommended by Ewha: Mon, Jul 20, 2026 - Mon, Sep 7, 2026
- (2) Institution chosen by the student: 09:00 Mon, Aug 24, 2026 - 17:00 Mon, Sep 7, 2026

※ If students find an institution through the official volunteer portal (such as 1365 or VMS), they are required to submit printed copies of both the application form and the portal application details.

C) How to register and confirm registration for 2026 Fall semester Social Service Activity.

- (1) How to register for Social Service Activity
 - (A) Institution recommended by Ewha: Check the list of institutions recommended by Ewha at MyEureka → Academics → Social Service Activity → Search/Register for Social Service Activity Institution.
 - (B) Institution chosen by the student: Download and fill in the registration form from the Social Service Team homepage Forms/Resources archive and submit it to the Social Service Team(Student Union 107-1). The registration will be finalized after a review.
- (2) Confirming registration for Social Service Activities: Confirm results of registration at MyEureka → Academics → Social Service Activity → Verification of Registration Results for Social Service Institution.

D) Course Delivery & Methods

- (1) Schedule of Theory classes for 2026 Fall semester: Students must attend the designated class on the designated day of the week, which is determined by their class section.
 - (A) First Session of Basic Education: Mon, Sep 7, 2026 - Thu, Sep 10, 2026(online)
 - (B) Second Session of Basic Education: Mon, Sep 14, 2026 - Thu, Sep 17, 2026(online)
 - (C) Midterm Evaluation Session: Mon, Oct 26, 2026 - Thu, Oct 30, 2026(in-person)
 - (D) Total Evaluation Session: Mon, Nov 23, 2026 - Thu, Nov 26, 2026(in-person)
- (2) Online Class: CyberCampus e-classes are designed to guide and support students throughout their social service activities. This is the online space where students will watch required lectures, submit their assignments, and continuously share and discuss their volunteer experiences with their classmates.

E) Recognized Activity Period

- (1) For 2026 Summer vacation: Tue, Jun 23, 2026 - Mon, Aug 31, 2026
 - (2) For 2026 Fall semester: Tue, Sep 1, 2026 - Fri, Nov 27, 2026
- 3) Certificate Issuance: A certificate will be issued upon completion of at least one course. If students complete multiple courses, they will all be combined into a single certificate. The Social Service Activity Certificate can also be printed out from E-넷 → Future planning → extracurricular activities → Community service certification.

G. Speaking Master Program(SMaP)

Speaking Master Program(SMaP) is a short-term intensive English training program run by the Global Language Education Office and is offered every summer and winter break for 16 days. Students participating in SMaP receive training in speaking under native professors with extensive experience. They will also have the opportunity to participate in classes of various contents. Students will not only acquire fluency, natural communicative skills, and confidence in English communication but also attain a broad understanding of the various cultural facets for appropriate English usage through close interaction with native professors.

- 1) Students must register for "Practical English" during the registration period for summer or winter session and will receive 3 undergraduate course credits on completion. The credits are recognized towards the number of required English course credits. However, the class may not substitute College English or Advanced English, which is a mandatory course
- 2) "Practical English" is offered for the summer/winter session and included in the 6 possible credits (3 credits for students on leave) for the vacation session. However, to get credit recognition, students must register in person for credits during the summer or winter session registration period. Tuition is calculated separately from that of summer and winter session courses.

H. Ewha Writing-Intensive School(EWIS)

Ewha Writing-Intensive School (EWIS) is run every summer and winter session for 16 days. Its objective is to ready students for global competency through rigorous training in the skills of competitive academic writing. Native language professors with master's and doctoral studies from universities abroad provide guidance and instruction through lecturing and daily feedback on student writing.

- 1) Students must enroll under the course name 'Ewha Writing-Intensive School (고급영어글쓰기)' during the summer and winter sessions. 3 credits are given upon completion of the general elective course.
- 2) 'Ewha Writing-Intensive School' is a summer/winter session elective course. Its credits are included in the 6 credits allowed for regular students and 3 credits for students on leave of absence. To be given credit, students must personally enroll during the registration period of the summer and winter sessions. Tuition is calculated separately from that of summer and winter session courses.

6. Guide to Minor, Double-Major, and Interdisciplinary Major

A. Completing a Double Major

- A) Students who have proposed one's major are able to register and cancel from the second semester of their freshman year. Students on a leave of absence, students who completed their course work, or who postponed their graduation cannot register and cancel a double major.
- B) Registration period: Thu., October 1. – Wed., October 7.
- C) Important notes
- (1) If a student's period of attendance is extended in order to complete a double major, she cannot cancel the double major.
 - ※ Limit to the period of attendance for double majors: 9 years (5 years for students transferring as juniors)
 - (2) As the number of students able to register for a double major is limited by each department in the Education College, students must be careful to not register for a double major too late as there may be no places left.
- 2) How to register
Register at Ewha homepage → EUREKA → MyEureka → Academic affairs → School registry → Apply for Double Major and Minor/ View Results.
- 3) Majors (departments) which do not allow or limit registration for double majors:
- A) Departments and majors related to medicine, nursing and pharmacy
 - B) The College of Education
However, students in the College of Education or who are selected as candidates for the teacher training program from outside the College of Education may do a double major.
For Elementary Education majors, students entering after 2012 may not apply for a double major.

- 4) Completed credits

- A) In principle, students must complete the credits from major foundation, and major courses required by their major (department) to graduate. (For Core Courses and Liberal Arts Courses-General Requirements, students only need to complete the credits required for their major)
- B) Special Notes
 - (1) When students in the College of Art and Design are double-majoring within the College of Art and Design, the major foundation courses of the first major are recognized as those of the double majors'. However, when double-majoring the Division of Design, students are required to complete extra 6 credits out of 6 major foundation courses offered in the Division of Design
 - (2) When students in the Engineering College(ELTEC college of Engineering) are double-majoring within the Engineering College(ELTEC college of Engineering), the major foundation courses of the first major are recognized as those of the double majors if those courses are same subjects (including "compatible repeat courses.")
- C) Recognition of overlapping credits

(Students who entered after 2012, ※ First major: main major/ Second major: Double major)

 - (1) If courses for a student's first major (major foundation, and major courses) are identical with courses for their double major, up to 9 credits from the course may be dually recognized.

Dual recognition for a certain course is limited to once.
 - (2) In colleges which have identical major foundation courses, major foundation courses from the 1st major will be recognized for those doing a double major.
 - (3) If doing a double major to obtain a teaching license, credits cannot be dually recognized.
 - (4) Credits cannot be dually recognized between double major-double major and double major-minor courses.

B. Completing a Minor

- 1) Registration
 - A) Students who have proposed one's major can register for a minor or cancel their registration from the second semester of their freshman year throughout their enrollment. Students on a leave of absence, students who completed their course work, or who postponed their graduation cannot register and cancel a minor.
 - B) Registration period: Thu., October 1. – Wed., October 7.
- 2) How to register

Register at Ewha homepage → EUREKA → MyEureka → Academic affairs → School registry → Apply for Double Major and Minor/ View Results.
- 3) Majors (departments) which do not allow, or limit, registration for a minor:
 - A) 5-year Architecture major and majors (departments) related to medicine, nursing, and pharmacy

5) Recognition of overlapping credits

Students cannot apply for an interdisciplinary major when entering college, but it is possible for two or more departments to offer courses for a combined interdisciplinary major, which can become a minor or double major.

2) Registration Period and How to Register

- Registration Period: Students may register during the registration and cancellation period for a minor and double major (first semester: April, second semester: October).
- How to Register: Students must apply and be approved for an interdisciplinary major as a minor or double major at Ewha homepage → EUREKA → MyEureka → Academic affairs → School registry → Apply for Double Major and Minor/ View Results

3) Credits to complete: 30 credits or more for a double major/21 credits or more for a minor

■ Method for the Completion of an Interdisciplinary Major

1) Restrictions on Registration for Interdisciplinary Majors

Although registration for most interdisciplinary majors is not restricted, restrictions do apply to the following majors. It is therefore recommended to check before registration.

3) Designation of Additional Requirements for Completion

Some interdisciplinary majors have additional requirements for completion in addition to or separate from basic restrictions on credits for established majors (departments). Additional requirements include **“minimum credits to complete from the courses of an established major (department),”** **“requisite courses,”** **“intensive courses,”** and **“minimum GPA required.”** For more information, **students can check out each major’s curriculum for the year they entered.**

4) Recognition of overlapping credits

(Students who entered after 2012, ※ first major: main major)

If the courses for a student’s first major (major foundation, and major courses) and courses for their interdisciplinary subject are identical, up to nine credits from courses for the first major can be counted towards their interdisciplinary double major, and up to six credits can be counted towards their interdisciplinary minor.

Dual recognition of a specific course is limited to one time.

(However, credits from college basic courses can only be counted towards a double major. Moral Education, Integrated Social Studies and Integrated Science have separate regulations.)

If the courses for a student’s first major (major foundation, and major courses) and courses for their interdisciplinary subject are identical, up to nine credits from courses for the first major can be counted towards their interdisciplinary double major, and up to six credits can be counted towards their interdisciplinary minor.

Dual recognition of a specific course is limited to one time.

(However, credits from college basic courses can only be counted towards a double major. Moral Education, Integrated Social Studies and Integrated Science have separate regulations.)

5) Notes on completing an interdisciplinary major

Liberal Arts courses in interdisciplinary major courses are only recognized as minor or double major courses for an interdisciplinary major. If canceling the interdisciplinary major, the course will be reclassified as a Liberal Arts course.

6) How to complete a graduation thesis for an interdisciplinary major as a double major and title of degree

According to school regulations, the graduation thesis must be submitted to the corresponding major in the semester a student intends to graduate. For questions regarding submission, seek the guidance of the corresponding department office or its head professor.

7. Guide to Certification Program

A. English and IT Certification Program

- 1) If students already have a certain required qualification in English or computer skills, they may receive credit recognition and a certificate when graduating.
- 2) Only currently enrolled students can register. Students on a leave of absence or students who have completed curriculum may not register.
- 3) Registration Period and Method
 - A) Registration period: Twice every year: Spring – late April; Fall – late October
 ※ For a specific schedule refer to Ewha Homepage → Academics→ Academic Calendar.
 - B) How to register: Register at MyEureka (Academic affairs → Grade → Application and inquiry for credit bank) and submit related documents to the college office.
 - C) Documents for submission: The original and one copy of certified language proficiency test results, or a Certified License. (The original will be returned after verifying the copy.)
 - D) Up to 6 credits may be awarded for Certification Test courses, including 3 credits for the Test of English Proficiency and 3 for the Test of Proficiency in Computer Skills. Credits awarded for proficiency in English and/or computer skill are not included in the number of credits per semester.
- 4) Standards for award of credit
 - A) English certification: If a student has obtained the following score on a certified language proficiency test within the last 2 years, 3 credits (grade S) for the Test of English Proficiency will be awarded.

- B) Computer Skills: If students have passed a certified computer skills test acknowledged by Ewha Womans University, 3 credits (grade: S) of Test of Proficiency in Computer Skills will be awarded. (Qualification types and standards can be found at Ewha homepage (Korean) → 학사안내 → 학사정보 → 학점인정 → 영어및정보인증제.)
- 5) Special notes: credits for English and computer skills programs will be confirmed after verifying the score or qualification with the testing organization. If the Certified English Proficiency Test results or Certified License is found to be counterfeit, the student will receive disciplinary action.
- 6) Credits earned through English or computer skills certification will only be included in credits needed for graduation, but not counted towards a student's GPA.

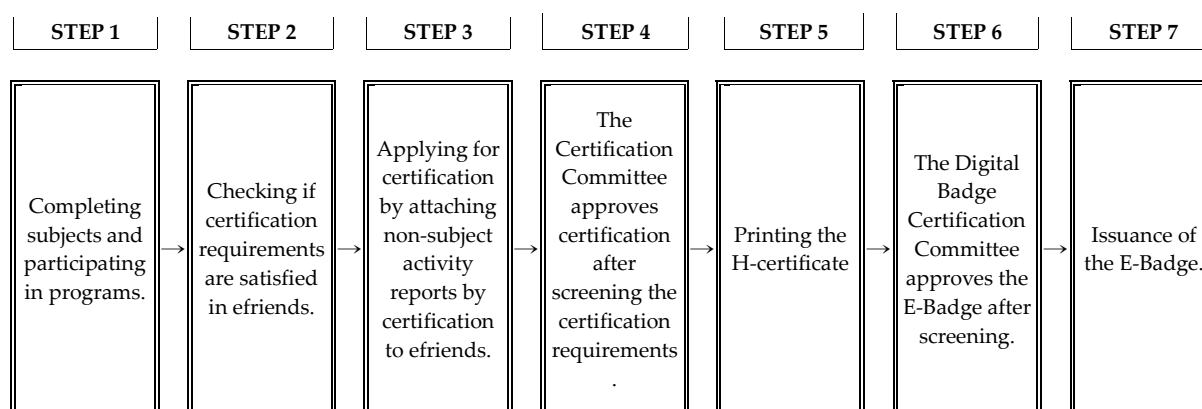
B. HOKMA Certification System

HOKMA Certification System was prepared by Hokma College of General Education to strengthen core competences of general education and promote self-initiated man-power development. The certificate and a digital badge (E-Badge) are awarded to the student who satisfies certification requirements by completing subjects designated by H-Certification and participating in non-subject activities. The certificate is the data that you are a wise talented person of reconciliations with various capabilities in entering into society. The E-Badge can be used in resumes and online portfolios to demonstrate competencies for employment and entrepreneurship, and can also be utilized for sharing achievements through social media and managing competencies in E-friends (E-벗).

- (2) If the student arranges external non-subject activities, Submit the non-subject activity report to efriends (E-벗), Foreign Language And Extracurricular Activities(대외비교과)
 - ◆ For other external programs, the student must directly process application for certification on the efriends. (Download the application form from the Hokma College of General Education website > 역량강화프로그램 > Notification > complete the form, and then submit it via efriends > Future Planning > Extracurricular Activities > Extracurricular Activities > Registration on the notice board and fill it out.)
- (3) Check if the certification requirements are satisfied in efriends Certification Management finally and apply for H-Sharing Activities Certification.
- (4) Screen the student's requirements and finally approve certification by opening the Certification Committee in the end of every semester.
- (5) Print the certificate in the page of certification management.
- (6) Check the E-Badge approved by the Digital Badge Certification Committee on the efriends (E-벗) My Page.

B) H-Certification in Reading Literacy

- (1) The student who wants certification takes courses of subjects required to obtain H-Certification in Reading Literacy and participates in non-subject programs related to various types of thinking and expression education (Related to reading and debate) as well as programs hosted by the thinking and expression education room of Hokma College of General Education.
 - The completion results of the subjects and the programs hosted by the personality education room of Hokma College of General Education are automatically updated in E-벗(efriends) > future planning > Extracurricular Activities > My Extracurricular Activities
- (2) If the student arranges reading and debate activities approved by the H-Certification in Reading Literacy Committee or external non-subject activities, Submit the non-subject activity report to efriends (E-벗), Foreign Language And Extracurricular Activities(대외비교과).
 - For other external programs, the student must directly process application for certification on the efriends. (Download the application form from the Hokma College of General Education website > 역량강화프로그램 > Notification > complete the form, and then submit it via efriends > Future Planning > Extracurricular Activities > Extracurricular Activities > Registration)
 - Reading and debate activity standard approved by the H-Certification in Reading Literacy Committee: Students' self-directed reading discussion groups and on-campus reading club activities. Excluding off-campus reading discussion groups. If you have been active for more than one year (at least 10 times) and submit an activity report on this, 25 points are awarded for external nonsubject activities.
- (3) Check if the certification requirements are satisfied in efriends Certification Management finally and apply for H-Certification in Reading Literacy.
- (4) Screen the student's requirements and finally approve certification by opening the

Certification Committee in the end of every semester.

- (5) Print the certificate in the page of certification management.
- (6) Check the E-Badge approved by the Digital Badge Certification Committee on the efriends (E-벗) My Page.

C) H-artizen Culture & Art Certification

- (1) The student who wants certification takes courses of subjects required to obtain H-artizen Culture & Art Certification and participates in non-subject programs related to various types of cultural and art education hosted by Hokma College of General Education, the Dance Research Institute, the Research Institute of Ceramics, the Ewha Womans University Museum, the Ewha Music Research Institute, the Center for the Performing Arts, and the Ewha Creative Academy.
 - The completion results of the subjects and the programs hosted by the personality education room of Hokma College of General Education are automatically updated in E-벗(efriends) > future planning > Extracurricular Activities > My Extracurricular Activities.
 - For programs hosted by the intramural institutes except Hokma College of General Education, the programs that recruit the application through the efriends are automatically updated in the status of H-artizen Culture & Art Certification. Or for the recruitment arranged by other methods, the student directly upload the participation certificate in the page of Nonsubject Registration after the events end.
 - (2) If the student arranges external non-subject activities, submit the non-subject activity report to efriends (E-벗), Foreign Language and Extracurricular Activities(대외비교과).
 - For other external programs, the student must directly process application for certification on the efriends. (Download the application form from the Hokma College of General Education website > 역량강화프로그램 > Notification > complete the form, and then submit it via efriends > Future Planning > Extracurricular Activities > Foreign Language and Extracurricular Activities(대외비교과) > Attach Application Form > Apply.)
 - (3) Check if the certification requirements are satisfied in efriends Certification Management finally and apply for H-artizen Culture & Art Certification.

8. Other Important Details

1) Registering for courses opened to students by other majors/departments

- A) Courses opened to students by other majors/departments for the Fall semester of 2026 are listed at the bottom of each department's schedule of major courses. (All courses opened to students by other major/department this year and semester are listed regardless of the curricula for different entering years.)
- B) Students should be careful when registering for courses opened to students by other majors/departments as these courses are only recognized as major credits based on the curriculum for their entering year. Courses changed or added to the curriculum after a student's entering year will also be acknowledged as major credits. **However, courses which were opened to students by other majors/departments before one's entrance year, but which are no longer acknowledged, will not be counted as major credits.**
- C) For a list of courses opened to students by other majors/departments in each year of entrance, refer to Ewha homepage (Korean version) → 유레카 → 마이유레카 → 학사행정 → 교과 → 타전공/학과인정교과목조회
- D) When registering for these courses, confirm courses open by other majors/departments for your affiliated major/ department and the maximum number of recognized credits (limited to certain majors) by consulting your academic advisor.

2) Registering for same courses offered by different major

In case a course is offered by different majors/department yet share the course title and the course number, it will be recognized as a same course. Class registration should be planned carefully and completed within the specified period.
